


METRO MILWAUKEE DEMOGRAPHICS

Demand for capable technology professionals is exploding in virtually every industry across the country. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects one million new science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) jobs will be created in the United States between 2012 and 2022.






